### The latest from Rockview Red Devons...

#### Weather and Weaning...

As we settle into Autumn and have a change in overnight temperatures, we are still desperately waiting for some much needed rain to arrive, as are most of us. It has been a hot, dry summer and we have little grass ahead of us leading into winter. This is having a compounding effect after the long drought last year in which the water table has still not recovered from. Despite this, the cows have raised some of the heaviest weaner heifers ever before and the weaner bulls are not far behind previous seasons. The 2 year old heifers have raised excellent first calves this season considering the lack of grass (220-240kg bull calves) and we are delighted with them. These heifers are in very good order and they have all got back in calf within the 50 days they had with the bull. We have not supplementary fed the cows or the heifers this season so it is a credit to the herd to be producing such good calves with the poor pasture they have had available this season. Just prior to weaning this year, we did feed a few conventional haylage bales to the cows and the calves, purely to have the cows 'teach' the calves to eat it! Last year, the calves took a week before they would eat any haylage as they weren't familiar with it. This year we really needed the calves on haylage at weaning time as we had very little grass saved. All of them have weaned particularly well this season and everyone has settled really quickly.

## Farm visit to Tapuwae and Thelmara Studs...

In early February, Ross and I travelled up to Whangaroa to visit Arthur Beazley's long-established Tapuwae Stud. We had a very interesting tour of the farm and had the pleasure of Tuppy Jones' company throughout the day. The cattle were in excellent condition despite the lack of grass which was obvious from the extremely low rainfall, again this year. The cows showed true Devon longevity, some with ages into the late teens. Cows with great length in the body, good size and obviously capable of handling whatever the conditions are - it was truly an inspirational visit. The old herd sire Tapuwae 635 was retiring in the front paddock at the grand old age of 15 years - he looked great! Thank you to Arthur for taking the time to show us around, we will be back!

We all ventured down to Tuppy's place for lunch. On the menu was Arthur's toasted sandwiches and he sure knows how to make a good toastie!

After lunch, we had a quick look around the remaining Thelmara herd. I did not realise Tuppy still had breeding cows! I remember back around 2002 at Maungakaramea, feeding hay to a bull bred by Tuppy, 'TJ' we called him. TJ left fabulous progeny and had a real personality, I will always remember him.

Sadly, Tuppy, who was recently awarded an Honorary Life Membership, explained that she was finally retiring from breeding her Devons and the 10 year old cows were raising their last calves before their departure. There were some very nice heifer calves there and the temptation was too much for me! I said we would buy all the heifer calves after they were weaned. But, as we drove home, I had an idea... The cows had not been run with a bull and there was a very nice 2 year old Gowan Ross Gentleman AB bull in the next paddock. After a quick discussion with Ross and then, Tuppy that night, I drove back up the next day and selected the very best, soundest cows in the paddock and we moved the 4 of them in with the

2 yr old bull. Then a couple more, quick trips north and we had cleared Tuppy's paddocks of all the quality breeding stock available. 21 x head in total! 8 x weaner heifers, 2 x weaner bulls, 6 x R2 heifers, 4 x cows and 1 x herd sire. They are to come down in two lots, the R2 heifers and herd sire have arrived and the cows/weaners are still to come. Thank you to Arthur, for delivering these cattle, it is very much appreciated! With these all being very distantly related to the Rockview herd, the new genetics will be welcomed as we move forward. We will autumn calve the R2 yr heifers next year and then slip them back into spring calving with the Rockview herd in the future. It is both a pleasure and a privilege to be continuing on with these cattle and we are really looking forward to it.

One never knows the outcome of a farm visit or what it will bring... but I think Ross will 'hide the cheque book' on any future visits!
